The books (appropriate for children ages 4 to 8) each model behaviors that families can adopt in order to grow stronger. Every title is paired with a downloadable reading guide designed for parents and caregivers that includes activities, discussion prompts and key ideas to take away from the story.



#### THE UGLY VEGETABLES

written and illustrated by Grace Lin

A young girl and her mother plant a garden. The girl is disappointed in the ugly vegetables they grow until harvest time comes and her mother makes a delicious Chinese soup.

## THIS STORY MODELS EXPLORING



The Ugly Vegetables shows how experiencing new ideas and opportunities can enhance your child's knowledge of the world and expand possibilities for him or her. Think about how:

- Working on the garden allows the girl and her mother to spend time together and create something they can both be proud of.
- By teaching her to plant seeds, care for plants and make soup, the girl's mother helps her daughter learn valuable skills.
- When she sees that ugly vegetables can make delicious soup, the girl learns that you can't always judge by appearances.
- Celebrating with neighbors and sharing resources helps the girl see the value of community and know that there are others she can learn from.

### TALK AND ASK YOUR CHILD QUESTIONS AS YOU READ



- The girl's garden is different from her neighbors' gardens. ASK: Why does she call the vegetables ugly? Does anyone else think the vegetables are ugly?
- The girl asks her mother many questions about the garden. ASK: Is there something special you want to learn? Who could help you?
- Working in the garden is something the girl and her mother do together. ASK: What is a special experience we have shared together? What do you remember about it? What did you enjoy or learn?
- The next spring, everyone plants flowers and ugly vegetables. ASK: Why are the neighbors also planting ugly vegetables? How do you think the girl feels about ugly vegetables at the end of the book?

Try new foods together. Taste foods from different cultures at local restaurants or find new recipes and cook a meal together as a family. Invite friends to eat with you or ask friends to teach your family how to cook their favorite foods.
